We sent out our buds and prickles asking for your Members Interests, i.e. your brick walls and stumbling blocks, but we have had very little response up to now. If you have a brick wall or would just like to have contact with any others with the same name and would like to participate by placing your brick wall name on a Members Interest list project, you need to do it quickly.

What happens then is we make a list of all the brick walls of all our members and publish it on our website. Your name, contact details and a distinguishing number are retained by the group and not published until or unless there is an enquiry about your named brick wall. We will then get in contact with you and ask if it is OK to forward your

contact details to the person enquiring about your brick wall name. It is entirely up to you whether you contact the enquirer or not, but your details are kept within the group and not released to anyone without your permission. So please respond with your brick wall names ASAP.

The information centre has moved into the kindergarten next door while construction of the new cinema and toilets on their old premises and the museum is completed so hopefully, we may get a few enquiries from visitors to Benalla from that move.

The Benalla Festival has again been cancelled so our proposed display at the Gardens oval during that weekend has now been abandoned.

Several new resources have been made by the research team and placed in the group's library, one of which is the "Convicts of Benalla & Winton project", which so far has identified eleven convicts currently buried in these cemeteries. Each has a comprehensive section on that particular convict including some relatives and event details. It staggered me that two small cemeteries like Benalla and Winton, so far away from the birthplace of these convicts have direct connection to our convict era. Another resource being worked on and updated at present is the "Pubs of Benalla Project"

Library workers are currently finding more space in the compactors to house these new resources for you to use, so come in and search the rooms for what you want and need, and have a chat, discussion, and a cuppa while you are here. Look forward to seeing you all in the rooms soon. Cheers, Bill.

RESEARCH REPORT

From the start of June until now the Research Team have completed 20 paid requests, well down on the previous three months. This brought in just under \$1000 to the group. Requests have included several rates lookups, two family tree charts, a Benalla house history, and research into a number of families including DALGLEISH/WELLS, VENIER/BERNADI, HOSKIN, BUCHANAN, CROXFORD, MOGFORD and the Mt Pleasant Hotel, MARTIN, PRIEST, KING and CHURCH.

Wendy Maxwell is finally back with us after 3 months having a wonderful time travelling around Queensland and South Australia.

As well as the completed Convicts at Benalla and Winton Cemeteries project, the Lone Graves project is still on-going.

Chick Walker from our research team has provided me with an article from the Benalla Ensign of Thursday 3 June 1954. The article refers to a local identity Mr. "Tup" Callow.

- ♣ Public record office Victoria holds copies of wills, probates, and titles to property.

- Coraweb has records of asylum and hospital records, cemeteries, convicts and shipping. Coraweb.com.au
- ♣ For military records search awm.gov.au
- For finding free family history records of Australian ancestors myancestors.com.au

This is just a small example, there are many more, which I hope to include in future editions. The folder containing this information sits on the table in the rooms and is available to any member and guest when they visit.

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
